


# All About



# Handy Recipe

### **Banana and Walnut Loaf**

4 bananas, mashed

6 oz walnuts, chopped

8 oz self-raising flour

5 oz sugar

2 oz fat, plus 1 tablespoon fat

3 eggs

1 tablespoon baking powder

½ tablespoon salt

1/4 tablespoon bicarbonate of soda



#### Method

In a medium-sized mixing bowl beat the sugar, 2 oz fat and eggs together until it is light. Add the mashed bananas to the mixture. Sieve the flour, baking powder and bi-carb together and add the banana mixture, beat well and then stir in the walnuts (you can use other types of chopped nuts, e.g. Pecan nuts, if you prefer). Grease a 9 inch loaf tin with 1 tablespoon of fat and pour in the mixture. Bake for 1 hour (or until the loaf is cooked) in a pre-heated oven at 180 degrees C (350 degrees F), or Gas 4. Additionally, you can add toasted walnuts as topping and ½ teaspoon of cinnamon to the mixture for a (slightly) fancier banana loaf.

This banana loaf will keep in an airtight container at room temperature for 3 to 4 days. You can also freeze the whole loaf if you want: Wait for it to cool, wrap it in plastic wrap and foil, then store in the freeze for up to 3 months.

In March, we visited All Hallows Museum in Honiton, where we were introduced to the Honiton lace industry and the Honiton Hippo. There was also an exhibition of local geological finds and old toys. The lace

exhibition was very extensive and there was also a demonstration and some of us had a go with varying degrees of success! The lace exhibition was of particular interest to several group members as they had relatives who worked there. We then went on to The

House of Marbles in Bovey Tracy. This included an unscheduled tour of Dawlish and Teignmouth as we were told by our bus driver that he had a problem with the bus and he didn't think he would be able to make it up Holden Hill. We eventually



arrived and had a lovely lunch in their restaurant before touring the various exhibitions. These

included a demonstration of glass blowing, a history of the old pottery works and the famous marble runs and toy display.

In April we visited A La Ronde a National Trust building near Exmouth. This is an incredible 16-sided building designed more than 200 years ago by 2 sisters who had a fascination with crafting. The

building was designed so that the sisters could move around



from room to room to follow the sun so that they had the best light for their work. Unfortunately, you can no longer go up into the gallery to see the extensive shell frieze, but you can see parts of it from the central vestibule and up

a narrow stairway. In another room, there is an amazing frieze made entirely from feathers . These also extend around the doorways. All the rooms are full of really interesting artifacts; if you have not been, a visit is highly recommended. We then went





for lunch at The Staddlers Arms where we enjoyed a very hospitality. Then we moved on to Killerton House, which had an exhibition of children's clothing upstairs, bringing back memories for many of us.

In May, we visited the Owl Sanctuary, where we stayed for the morning to take in all their displays and talks. Following lunch at the Sanctuary, we went on to Trelawney Garden Centre. The June trip will include Buckfast Abbey, where we will have lunch in their restaurant before going on to The

Butterfly Farm and Otter Sanctuary. Amanda and I welcome any suggestions you may have for places to visit and look forward to your company.

#### Film Club

The Film Club is open to anyone who is a member of the Theatre Group. We meet every month in our own homes to show a film of the host's choice. A discussion follows, plus refreshments. Occasionally we go to the Arts Cinema in Plymouth to see a film.

In January this year, we saw "When the Crawdads Sing" (2022). This was a story about a girl living on her own in the marshes of North Carolina. She faces prejudice from the local community and when a local man is found dead she is arrested. The group enjoyed the film especially the twist at the end. February's film was "Maestro" (2023) starring Carey Mulligan, Bradley Cooper and Leonard Bernstein. It was an American biographical romantic drama film that centres on the relationship between American Leonard Bernstein and his wife. Bradley Cooper also directed the film. The acting was excellent and the group gave it a score of 8.

The film in March was "Big Fish" (2003) starring Ewan McGregor, Albert Finney and Jessica Lange. This film had a mixed reaction from the group. It was a magical adventure; some described the film as fascinating, clever to unusual and weird. The score given was 6.

In April we watched "Hard Times" (2009) starring John Lynch, Linda Hamilton and Lochlaiin O'Mearain. This was a comedy set in Ireland featuring a village when most of the residents are a bit depressed. This all changes when four local men steal a van containing Viagra. They panic when they think they about to be arrested and hide it a holy well where it leaks into the local water supply. Following this, the village thrives and everyone is much happier. The group thought the film was light hearted and easy viewing; the score we gave it was 8.

The film in May was the classic "Far from the Madding Crowd" (1967) starring Julie Christie, Terence Stamp and Alan Bates. This story of a young woman who is vain. She falls in love with a soldier who treats her badly. In typical Hardy stories several disasters happen, but it has a happy ending which is unusual. The group gave it a score of 8.

Our Art Cinema visit was on 17<sup>th</sup> January. We watch "One Life" starring Anthony Hopkins, Johnny Flynn, Helena Bonham-Carter and James Hawes. This was a true story about Nicholas Winton, a young London broker. He went to Prague (the capitol of Czechoslovakia at the time) after hearing about hundreds of refugees who had fled from the Nazis in the 1930s, and were living in appalling conditions. He organised with the help of volunteers in Prague and his mother in London, to obtain visas for 669 children and enabled them to travel by train to Britain. They then went to live with foster parents. The group thought it was a very good story about an exceptional human being. It was very emotional in parts especially when the last train didn't manage to leave Prague due to the outbreak of World War Two. The film was given a score of 9.

#### Tai Chi & Qigong Group

The Spring Term 2024 for our group saw a slight reduction in numbers due to members' personal and health circumstances. Despite this we had new members join, therefore our group membership remains very bouyant at well over 40 members.

As well as the practice of various Qigongs, Les Law, our Instructor expanded the Tai Chi Forms we practise to include the 48 Form and 103 long Form This may sound like a complicated series of moves to remember, but there is much repetition of basic movements.

These basic movements have highly imaginative, descriptive names some of which to our western minds bear no relation to the actual movements. For example, 'Stroking the Horses' mane, Playing with clouds, Stroking the Peacock's tail, Grasping needles from the sea, Playing the Lute, White Crane, Repulsing the Monkey' and more!

However, a point to remember is that many movements in Tai Chi and Qigong have been derived from observing the movements of animals. When practising various movements, it can be helpful to imagine one is moving like that animal. For example, when practising the movement 'Flying like a Bird' imagining our arms are wings can lend a style and grace to the movement, rather than just

#### **Last Chance Blues Band (LCBB)**

The Band is a new group, formed recently in April 2024. It is a 'closed' group ie restricted membership with no casual drop-in. This is in line with precedents for other U3A Music groups eg Orchestras, Jazz & Rock bands, to protect group stability & performance standards.

We are a group of musicians with varied experience and our members include 1 Lead guitarist, 2 Rhythm guitarists, a Bass guitarist and Drummer. Vocals are shared between 3 members.

Our purpose as musicians & U3A volunteers, is to provide free, live Rhythm & Blues music for U3A Members, Community Groups & local events in Saltash eg Fairs & Festivals, on request.

Our musical interest is R&B music from the late 19th Century to the present. Blues music has its origins in the songs of mainly Black musicians living in the USA. The sentiments expressed in Blues music from the USA resonated with many musicians elsewhere, especially Europe. Combined with the development of the solid-body, electric guitar from the 1950s, cover versions of Blues songs in the 1960s - before artists started writing their own material - launched the careers of Elvis Presley, John Mayall's Blues breakers, Eric Clapton, Rolling Stones, Fleetwood Mac, Animals & Beatles, to name but a few!

We are currently regularly rehearsing to develop a Set List of songs (30) to perform in a 90 min period with a break mid-way. This will take us a few months, but once completed we hope to offer to do a gig for members, which would have to be somewhere like Saltash Social Club. So all you Baby Boomers who like a bit of Rock & Blues, watch this space!
